Ideal for little nippers...

350 years ago a local fishing boat caught a fish that was nearly 7 metres long. That's longer than some of the boats in the harbour!

How many of these can you see from where you are standing:

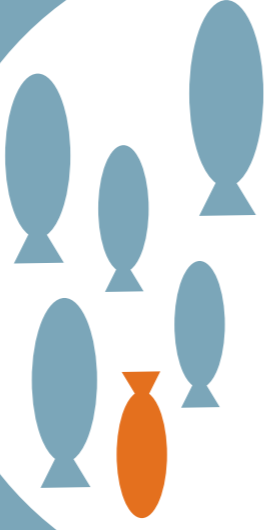
Seagulls

Did you know that the first surfing in Britain was by two Hawaiian princes in Bridlington bay?

The Yorkshire Coast often saw pirates attacking other ships, although you probably wouldn't have seen the 'skull and crossbones' flag flying on a ship in this part of the world.

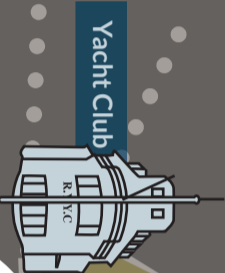
This corner of the Harbour has lots of maritime relics. See if you can find these:

- Ship's rudder
- Anchor point
- Brake post



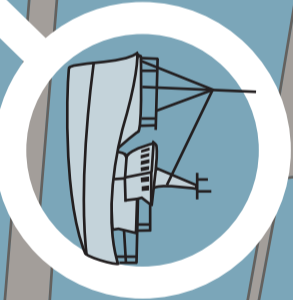
The Boat Crane lifts boats out of the water to be repaired or painted. It can lift 75 tonnes - which is a pretty big boat! Look around and you might be able to find out how many double decker buses that would be...

The crane can lift the equivalent of buses!



Each boat has a code (letters followed by numbers) which tells you which harbour it is registered at. How many of each of the following can you find?

- H
- GY
- SH



There are carved stone placemarkers set into the paving on this side of the harbour. Can you find these three?

- A Queen
- A Lobster
- A Spiral



The Gansey Girl statue includes lots of fish each featuring the name of a local fishing family. How many fish can you count?

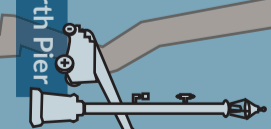
Fish Quay
